
Time is fleeting and each of us is only given so much. It's not too late to do the things today you said you'd do yesterday or tell those you love how much you care.

Thoughts from the Deputy Grand Master

Recently the subject of proficiency has been on my mind and been discussed with a couple of brothers whose opinions I respect. The two types of proficiency we discussed were that required to become the Worshipful Master of a lodge and that required to become a Master Mason; two considerably different in terms of difficulty.

It seems that in the past few years we in Arizona have been making the memorization requirement of ritual more difficult for the progressive lines. We have added what at first glance appear to be small increments of the ritual, i.e. the Apron and the "G" lectures. Legislation last year at the Annual Communication took another approach by giving the WM the option to name a designee for the parts that indicate the WM should be reciting that part as well. The proficiency card attesting to the brother's ability is a source of great anxiety for those in lodge progressive lines, and a rush to complete the next step just prior to elections. Some dedicated and active brothers who see the requirements decide that becoming a Worshipful Master is too hard and will not try, although they are good men and Masons with much to offer the craft in terms of leadership. Others may try and find it just too difficult and drop out. Many lodges end up recycling Past Masters because no one is willing to put in the effort. To ease some of this we passed legislation extending the validity of a proficiency card from five (5) to seven (7) years from the last signature date.

I have been approached by a couple of brothers as to why we require memorization in the first place. Why not just read it? To this question my response is that my own experience tells me when you put in some effort to accomplish a task you will place a great value on it. And when you spend time going over the words of the ritual then the meaning and understanding of that ritual is significantly enhanced. A simple reading just does not convey the message and indicates to the candidate that we are not quite as committed to our rituals as we claim to be. Anyone can stand up and read aloud without having any understanding of the importance of the words but working to fully comprehend and reciting our ritual benefits not just the recipient, the candidate, but also the brother presenting the ritual.

This brings me to the other proficiency requirement, that of a newly initiated, passed or raised candidate. Each degree has an oral examination that uses a question-and-answer format and that includes the obligation for each degree. This can sometimes be very difficult for the newly initiated brother as it does require memorization, and language that can be markedly different from the every day language we are accustomed to. The obligation can be difficult to memorize, especially the Master Mason obligation which is longer than the others. On a side note, the best proficiency examination I have ever seen was when two newly obligated brothers conducted the exam in open lodge by questioning each other. One would ask a question, the other would answer and then ask the next question and so on. An absolutely wonderful presentation by the two.

In addition, there are the candidate readings, and questionnaire to complete. However, and this is a big however, the AMC in §5-1.1.1 Minimum Proficiency for EA, FC or MM states that "A minimum proficiency consisting of the steps, the dueguards, the signs, the grips, the words, and the completion of the approved Candidate Education Program is acceptable as the minimum proficiency in Arizona." This should be easy enough to accomplish but I have seen instances where even this is beyond the new brother's capabilities. Many new brothers, and their coach or mentor, seem to feel that the minimum is all that is necessary and that is all that they do. Troublesome to me is that often even that minimum requirement is accomplished in committee and not in open lodge. This denies the rest of the lodge the opportunity to see the new brother demonstrate his proficiency and then to recognize his hard work.

And here lies the problem. We demand a lot from a brother who desires to serve the lodge in the East as Worshipful Master, as we should. But we sometimes do not require enough of a new brother to demonstrate his commitment to Masonry, his understanding of our history, symbols, and allegories and to becoming a better man. I applaud the lodges that require a full catechism for proficiency. They have met the high standard and communicate that to their new members as an expectation. They do not hurry a brother through the degrees but give him the time and support needed to indeed become a better man by becoming a Mason.

From The Secretary

As I do every year at this time, here are the numbers for the lodge. We started 2024 with 216 members. We had 7 pass to the Celestial Lodge above, lost 1 to a demit, and 2 were suspended for non-payment of dues. On the plus side, we had 1 affiliation and 1 reinstatement from nonpayment of dues. As of December 31st, we had 208 members on the books. This includes 44 Perpetual Members (4 are also Senior Life), 23 Senior Life, and 11 under Section 9-106. We pay per capita on 174 members and have 134 dues paying members. Between per capita and other fees, we should owe Grand Lodge about \$6937 as part of our annual returns. Now you know why I am always asking members to pay their dues.

As for candidates, we have 8 who are at some stage in their degree work. This includes one brother who we have asked New York to complete his degrees as a courtesy (done on a regular basis).

As of Dec 31st, we have 64 brothers who have yet to pay their 2025 dues. If you haven't done so, please send them in. If you need help with your dues, please let either WM Trevor or myself know so we can help you. On a side note, you must have a current dues card to be a signer on a petition or application for affiliation. If you have not paid your current years dues, the system will flag it.

Another Winterhaven Parking Fundraiser is in the books. While we fairly successful, the car count was down compared to other years. We also noticed a lot less traffic on Country Club this year during the event. Many thanx to all who helped out and there will be a more complete report at stated meeting.

And for those of you making New Year's resolutions, how about adding this—come to lodge!. If you can't, reach out to a brother you haven't seen for a while and see how they are doing.
