Time is fleeting and each of us is only given so much. It's not too late to do the things today you said you'd do yesterday or tell those you love how much you care.



From The Secretary

"Books are the compasses and telescopes and sextants and charts which other men have prepared to help us navigate the dangerous seas of human life." Jesse Lee Bennett

I have a confession to make, I am a book nerd. Growing up my parents encouraged me to read and I used to spend hours at the library reading. I was a student volunteer in my high school library which eventually led me to getting a position at the city library as a "stack monkey". We had closed stacks and if you wanted a book, you had to request it. I was one of the guys that traversed five levels to find the books you wanted. And eventually had to put them back on the shelves. When we got slow, we would read shelves—making sure every book was in its correct place. While reading shelves you were also exposed to new ideas and if you saw a book you were interested in, you checked it out. I spent a lot of time in the sciences and history sections. For lighter reading I was often in the fiction section, reading fiction that looking back on I probably should not have been reading. My girlfriend at the time wanted to go see M*A*S*H and my mother didn't think it was a good idea. My father responded, he has a copy of the book in his book case. Dad won out, and we went to see the movie (I was junior in high school at the time).

As Masons we should be able to read and make a critical assessment about what we just read. In the second degree lecture, rhetoric is named as one of the seven arts and sciences. It is between grammar and logic. Grammer as we all know is the study of how words and their component parts combine to form sentences. Those of us who are old farts all remember diagraming sentences in English class. Rhetoric, on the other hand, takes grammar to the next step and can be defined as the art or study of using language effectively and persuasively. Once we understand these two steps we move on to logic. Logic is the study of the principles of reasoning, especially of the structure of propositions as distinguished from their content of method and validity in deductive reasoning.

Why do I remind us of these steps on the staircase? We are at the crossroads affecting the future of our great nation. While as masons, we do not get into political discussions, we do encourage each of us to participate and vote our conscience. We must be aware of the various fallacies of logic as we hear the arguments and rhetoric presented to us. We need to research and study the issues before us and act as good citizens.

That is all for this month and I promise I will have more next month.

AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK

November 18-22, 2024

The Grand Master in his Edict 2024-01 has directed all lodges to observe the spirit of American Education Week by participating in and/or supporting special activities which recognize the Public Schools of Arizona during the month of November

This year the Grand Lodge Public Schools Committee has two programs. The first is a Student Community Service Award which is intended to recognize students who are making a difference in their school or community. These are for students in grades 3 through 8 and include a monetary award.

The second program is a Classroom Grant for Teachers which has traditional been used by the teacher and students for items such as programs, books, and classroom supplies, etc...These are for grades K through 8 and there is only one grant request per teacher. The number of grants awarded will depend on the amount of each grant and how much of the budget is available.

In recent years the lodge has supported programs like Bikes for Books. The last several years we worked with Delta Kappa Gamma, the teacher's group, in support of local teacher and schools. This is through their Educator Excellence program. Last year we provided cases of paper to be distributed to teachers as part of their goodie bags of supplies.

Sept 25, 1865 - Pope Pius IX issued the Bull "Multiplices Intern" in opposition of Freemasonry


Sept 26, 1872—AAONMS organized in NYC

Editor's Note—Another one from my files. This was originally published in our September 2000 trestle board and is pretty much true today.

For a little history, in the days of dial-up (the early 90s) there were several different masonic forums on AOL, Prodigy, and CompuServe. They were all good places for brother masons around the world to socialize and learn about the craft in other countries. This led to a formation of a lodge under the UGLE which usually meets in England, but is made up of brothers around the world. The original formers of the lodge met on the internet and today there are over 600 members, from over 40 countries. The name of the lodge? Internet Lodge #9659 which is recognized by the Grand Lodge of Arizona. Before the pandemic we had a Past Master of Internet Lodge visit on a fairly regular basis. LABOR DAY

What is Labor Day? We all know it is the first Monday in September. It is traditionally considered the unofficial end of the summer season. It is one of the federal holidays recognized in the United States. Its purpose is to honor and recognize the American labor movement, and the works and contributions of laborers to the development and achievements of the United States.

In the late 19th century, as the trade unions and labor movements grew, it was proposed a day be set aside to celebrate labor. The first parade was promoted by the Central Labor Union and the Knights of Labor and was held in New York City. In 1887, Oregon was the first state to make it an official holiday. By the time it became an official federal holiday on June 28, 1894 when Grover Cleveland signed it into law, thirty states officially celebrated Labor Day. As late as the 1930s, unions were encouraging workers to strike to make sure they got the day off.

There was a movement to make May 1st as a celebration of labor in commemoration of the bloody Haymarket Affair of 1886. Present Cleveland felt that May date would tend to commemorate the Haymarket Affair which would strengthen the socialist and anarchist movements which were present at the time. As it was a less inflammatory date, Labor Day became law in 1894. Since the mid 1950s, we have celebrated Loyalty Day or Law Day on May 1st.

It is considered the unofficial end of summer as most schools and other fall events start up right after it. I remember growing up we started school the Wednesday after Labor Day with that Tuesday being the day to get ready to go back to school.

And for you fashionistas, it is the last day to wear white (unless you gre a bride) or seersucker.




